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# Boy, 6, mauled by dog

on the south side. The dog's owner accompanied him.

"I knew that the owner couldn't get the dog off the boy," Mr. Thompson said. She hurt her wrist attempting to control her dog. He then took the dog and its owner to her home and left them on the home's back porch.

Mr. Thompson was told by others at the scene that the dog jumped over the fence on the east side of the house which is located two properties west of Victoria on the south side of the street.

"That's the second time the dog has gotten out," he said.

Mr. Thompson told the dog's owner he didn't want to hurt her pet.

"In a way I feel for the dog," he said. "I had to do what I had to do to get the dog off the boy. In my experience that big a dog in town should be muzzled. And it's lucky the boy had the helmet on."

Mr. Thompson estimated the dog weighed more than 150 pounds but could have been even bigger. The average male Rottweiler dog is about 130 pounds.

**Hero?**

While he has heard some local residents describe his actions as heroic, Mr. Thompson said that's not how he looks at it. "I just did what anyone else would do. I have a girlfriend with two young kids. I was just lucky I was there. If I wasn't it could have turned out worse."

The victim's grandfather said Mr. Thompson "deserves a medal" for pulling the dog off his grandson. He added the fact his grandson was wearing a bicycle helmet prevented the dog from biting into his skull.

Aylmer Police Chief Andre Reymer said the boy was visiting friends in Aylmer along with his family at the time of the attack.

He and a four-year-old were bicycling on a sidewalk, with an adult watching from nearby, on Sydenham Street East when the Rottweiler from a house across

the street jumped a 1.5-metre (four and a half foot) fence and chased after them.

The dog owner was outside and was shocked by her dog's action, Chef Reymer said. She chased after it and caught it briefly, but it broke free and attacked the six-year-old, who had fallen to the ground.

The dog first bit the boy's head and then his leg, Chief Reymer said.

"The dog wouldn't let go of the child," he said. "It grabbed onto his leg and wouldn't let go."

Mr. Thompson grabbed the dog by the collar and hauled it off the child, forcing the animal back across the street into the owner's home, Chief Reymer said, while the boy was taken into a nearby home at 241 Sydenham St. East where first-aid was administered until police, firefighters and paramedics arrived.

The boy was taken to St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital and then later transferred to London for additional treatment.

**"Good spirits"**

He was released Saturday, Chief Reymer said, and seemed "in remarkably good spirits" despite the attack.

The dog had no previous record of such behaviour, Chief Reymer said. "It was a shock to all."

The dog owner was "very co-operative and remorseful," Chief Reymer said, and offered to immediately have the three-year-old animal euthanized.

But instead, at the request of officials at Elgin St. Thomas Public Health, the dog is being quarantined in a cage in the owner's home for the next 10 days to see if the animal exhibits any transferable diseases such as rabies before a decision is made about its fate.

An investigation under the Dog Owners' Liability Act was under way, Chief Reymer said.

A neighbour of the dog owner, Harry Hewbank, said this is the first time he knew of a dog at the house causing a

problem.

"No, never," Mr. Hewbank told The Aylmer Express when asked if the dog in question had ever been a concern to him. "As a matter of fact, we recently commented that we've never heard him bark, ever."

Mr. Hewbank said there are two dogs at his neighbour's home.

**No prior problems**

"Before (Friday), we never even knew they were there," Mr. Hewbank said. "If they got out they just stayed by the house. (The attack) was something new. We've never had any problems at all with the dogs. It's surprising."

Chief Reymer said he too was surprised that the attack happened.

"It was a suitable size fence (for a dog) in our opinion," Chief Reymer said. "We have no records on file of aberrant behaviour from this animal. It is a first-time occurrence."

Despite the events of Friday, Chief Reymer said the boy was feeling well enough to stop by the Aylmer Police Station with his family for a visit during the East Elgin Doors Open event on Saturday afternoon.

"He was in surprisingly good spirits," Chief Reymer said.

As for the boy's injuries, he said, "I can't give you a stitch count, but it was significant."

The Aylmer Police will now coordinate their investigation with Elgin St. Thomas Public Health, Chief Reymer said, adding if it is determined the dog should be destroyed an order would probably have to be issued unless the owners decide to euthanize it on their own.

Chief Reymer felt the current arrangement for containing the animal was safe.

"He's being kept inside in a kennel," he said. "We don't believe there is an immediate risk to the community."

Chief Reymer cautioned anyone not to approach any large pets, but if it becomes unavoidable, to not make any "sudden actions."

"Animals are unpredictable," he said. "Do not approach stray animals, especially in groups. All animals have a pack mentality."

Children who encounter large animals and are concerned should go to a house they feel safe approaching, especially if there is a Block Parent sign in the window, Chief Reymer said.

**Leash a must**

In Aylmer, dogs must be under the control of their owners and be leashed so the animal cannot stray more than three metres, Chief Reymer said, although this isn't a bylaw the police often enforces.

"Generally unleashed dogs aren't a problem," Chief Reymer said. "Most people we see walking their dogs are conscientious owners. We address it when it becomes a matter of concern."

There is no criterion listed in the bylaw to his knowledge about how high or strong a fence should be to contain an animal.

"This yard was definitely fenced," he said. "(The owners) did have a contained animal that unfortunately got out."

Chief Reymer added the incident could have been much worse and thanked Mr. Thompson for his efforts to separate the dog from the boy.

"All parties involved were interested in the child's interests first," he said.

The boy was bicycling in the area during the time of the attack and was eventually taken to St. Thomas Elgin General Hospital and later transferred to a London hospital for additional treatment before he was released on Saturday.

## Tax critic warns of pending property assessment changes

Bill MacIntyre, a former Springfield reeve and one of the leaders of a Malahide taxpayer revolt, urged township councillors last week to warn property owners of forthcoming reassessment across the municipality.

The reassessment would be conducted by the Municipal Property Assessment Corporation, which he knew wasn't under council's control.

However, he said, someone had to take the lead warning residents what was coming.

The valuations in the reassessment would be based on each property's value as of Sept. 1, he said.

Notices from MPAC would start being mailed out Nov. 9, he said, and property owners had to scrutinize them carefully.

He owned nine acres of farmland, he said, and previously severed a half-acre for his daughter's house.

In a subsequent assessment notice, he found he supposedly owned 17.5 acres.

Instead of subtracting a half acre from his assessment, he said, MPAC had somehow added together how much he used to own and how much he owned after the severance to get 17.5.

Many property owners didn't read their notices and would

never have seen that, he said.

MPAC admitted its mistake, he added, but he still had to file a formal appeal to get the assessment changed.

Mr. MacIntyre said the last time his mother's property was reassessed, the supposed value of her Springfield home jumped to \$190,000 from \$129,000.

He researched sales of similar properties in the village, filed an appeal and the value was changed to \$143,000.

If that hadn't been done, he said, his mother would have ended up paying an additional \$600 a year in property tax.

He understood from a recent

MPAC presentation to councillors that the projected value of farmland in this area was going up 60 percent over the next four years, and houses 12 percent.

Councillor Mark Wales, who's also president of Ontario Federation of Agriculture, warned farmers to check not just the values of their homes and land, but other buildings as well.

A bunkhouse that was vacant or used only seasonally might end up classed as a more expensive residential home, and other buildings might end up in commercial or industrial classes.

"Check everything," he urged.
